Points of Interest

- Forest Preserve: Hiking, fishing, picnicking, and wildlife viewing opportunities abound in the 605 acre Forest Preserve. The Warner W. Plahs Wildflower Field is a "must see" in spring. Be sure to visit the 4,000 year old Shell Ring (listed on the National Register of Historic Places), and enjoy a scenic bike ride down the rice dike. Bicycles are not permitted on the nature trails, so please park your bicycles at the locations provided.
- Harbour Town: One-of-a-kind boutiques and galleries, waterfront restaurants, cafés and lounges, great live entertainment including Gregg Russell's seasonal family concerts, boating and water sports. Enjoy the view from atop the landmark candy-striped lighthouse.
- Lawton Stables: Discover the scenic Forest Preserve on horseback.
 Guided tours are available and depart daily. Treat your children to a pony ride or the petting farm. Open 6 days a week.

Sea Pines Beach Club:

The Sea Pines Beach Club offers indoor and outdoor dining with beautiful views of the Atlantic Ocean. Visitors can also enjoy seasonal live entertainment.

The Shops at Sea Pines Center:
Top quality jewelry, men's and women's clothing, accessories, antiques, books, full service spa and bike rental. Visit one of several excellent restaurants, a gas station, fitness center and post office.

Plantation Golf Club:

The elegant clubhouse serves the Heron Point and Atlantic Dunes golf courses and offers a premier event, golf, and dining experience. Fraser's Tavern, located in the Plantation Golf Club, showcases Lowcountry-inspired cuisine and locally sourced produce and products. Boasting a 35-foot rotunda ceiling and floor-to-ceiling windows that provide an incredible 270-degree golf view, the restaurant offers indoor and outdoor seating options.

South Beach Marina Village:

Plenty of fun and entertainment for the whole family and the home of The Salty Dog. A unique collection of shops and restaurants nestled in a New England style fishing village overlooking beautiful Braddock Cove.

Stoney-Baynard Ruins: Enjoy a self-guided walk of the ruins of the Baynard estate. The site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is the only tabby ruins of a main house on Hilton Head Island.

Have you seen our Legacy Oaks?

A Live Oak, unlike other trees, has a branch spread that exceeds its height. These oaks are 45 to 90 feet high, with trunks from 28 to 80 inches in diameter and range in age from 135 to 360 years old, the oldest of which is located in Six Oaks Park.

The Legacy Oak Program was created as a walking or biking tour and includes 15 Legacy Oaks. You cannot visit these trees by car as some are located in areas that are not accessible by vehicle. The entire tour takes approximately 3 1/2 hours by bike.


Rules of the Road

The leisure trails in Sea Pines are shared by joggers, bikers, and walkers. To ensure that everyone safely enjoys our trails, here are a few helpful tips.

- Stay in single file on the right side of the trail.
- Use of roadway, where leisure trail exists, is prohibited.
- Be aware of vehicles. They are not required to stop while you are waiting to cross a roadway.
- Pedestrians have the right of way on trails.
 When passing, announce "Passing on left".
- Everyone, especially children, should wear a helmet when biking.
- Obey all state and local traffic laws, including the use of hand signals and observance of traffic signs.
- Guests who leave Sea Pines must obtain a pass code at the gate exits to gain re-admittance to Sea Pines.
- No bike riding on golf cart paths.
- No motorized vehicles on trails (this includes bikes and scooters).
- · Maintain a safe speed.
- Night biking is dangerous and is not permitted in Sea Pines.
- Vehicles should never stop and wave on anyone waiting to cross the roadway. This will, and does, cause accidents in Sea Pines.
- Use of leisure trails in Sea Pines is limited to residents and guests.
- Lock bikes when not in use.





- Alligators are ambush predators and can move faster than you or your pets
- · Keep pets and children away from water's edge
- · Swimming or wading is prohibited in Sea Pines'

- When fishing or crabbing do not throw used bait or fish parts into the water

Please be aware vehicles are not required to stop while you wait to cross the roadway.

- * Fishing is for Sea Pines Property Owners and guests staying in Sea Pines.
- * For guests staying in Sea Pines a Sea Pines fishing permit is required and can be purchased for a fee from Community Services Associates (CSA), 175 Greenwood Drive, (843) 671-1343.
- * Anyone fishing from shore in the ocean or any other navigable body of salt/brackish water within Sea Pines must also have a South Carolina saltwater fishing license.
